
A Tribute to Marshall Mohler

First and foremost, Marshall Mohler was a scientist...his field of study just happened to be animals. From the time WWII ended until the summer of 2008, Marshall's life was dedicated to animal breeding, animal research, and animal agriculture. The beneficiary of his work was the cattle industry, specifically, but not limited to the Red Poll breed.

Marshall passed away in late March of 2010, leaving behind a legacy of what one person can accomplish when they set their mind to a goal and pursue it.

Marshall was a stickler for details and accuracy. He was big on honesty and integrity and put forth little effort in being a "People Pacifier or a People Pleaser". Many cattleman over the years proclaimed how much they respected Marshall for his views and opinions, but were uncomfortable with his sometimes abrasive nature. Yet, that was Marshall...brilliant but sometimes irritating.



On ARPA's website, there is a copy of the Mohler story, highlighting his accomplishments; I suggest you read them again. His love for data, records, and programs to promote beef cattle were amazing. His office, now a part of ARPA archives, was filled with hand printed documentation of all of his research. He never learned to use a computer, preferring longhand in very descriptive, legible handwriting.

He loved his wife, his children and grandchildren, his land and his cattle. Marshall's cattle were at the forefront of every national show and national sale from the late sixties until his retirement in 1985....dominating that period with more National Champions than anyone else. Yet, it was his study of the carcass and how to improve it that shall be his defining moment. To my knowledge, no one has ever duplicated his interest and excitement for carcass information.

He will be missed...in all of his single mindedness. One country, one University, one wife, one family, one job, one breed, one long lasting and ongoing dedication and love affair with the Red Poll breed. Always loyal, often frustrated, constantly thought challenging and highly opinionated, Marshall Mohler almost single-handedly made the Red Poll breed that all of us enjoy what it is today. As his life was drawing to a close, he was still telling me, "I don't think people understand all that we accomplished with these red cows". Rest in peace good friend, I think you made your mark. Long live the Red Poll breed.

PAGE 9, ITEM 22: Change term "Association" to "Board of Directors"

PROPOSAL 3 -

PAGE 10, ITEM 29: Amend entire paragraph to read: The progeny resulting from artificial insemination, which satisfy the Conditions of Registry in all other respects, shall be eligible for registry by the owner of the dam. The sire must meet requirements as stated in the rules of the Association.

PROPOSAL 4 -

PAGE 10, ITEM 30C: Delete entire paragraph

Steve Scott Memorial Steer Carcass Contest to be Held as Part of Junior Show

Steve Scott was one of the leading proponents in the Red Poll breed for measuring and documenting carcass quality. He practiced his belief by routinely collecting ultrasound carcass data on Lazy 'S' breeding stock replacement heifers and bulls. In honor of Steve's leadership in encouraging the application of new technologies in our breed and in Steve's memory, a carcass quality competition based on ultrasound measurements will be included as part of the Junior Preview Show in Coffeyville, KS. Any steer entered in the regular show will automatically be entered and may participate in the carcass contest. There will be no additional entry or ultrasound measurement expense for the junior entrants. Weights and ultrasound measurements will be collected on Saturday morning of the show. Winners will be announced and prizes awarded on Sunday during the steer competition of the regular show.



Spring in the Piedmont - Blue Ridge RPA Field Day

The Blue Ridge Red Poll Association Spring meeting and Field Day was held on April 24th at Wilkshire, north of Burlington, N.C. Green grass and red cattle greeted the visitors for the day. Our goal for the event was to educate the group about Red Poll cattle being a natural alternative in the beef industry. As the day arrived, cars lined the road on either side, as 87 people participated from the following nine different states: Virginia, Tennessee, West Virginia, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Arkansas, Michigan, and North Carolina. It was certainly interesting to see all the different license plates on the farm.

The purpose of this event was to reach out to five groups of people within the cattle industry: veteran breeders, grass finish breeders, commercial breeders, perspective beginners, and the wellness consumers. We wanted each of these groups to be exposed to how Red Poll cattle can benefit them. Purebred livestock breeders have all the tools to produce quality genetics. The commercial breeder can benefit from heterosis by crossing their herds with Red Polls naturally or with available semen. Live finished steers are obtainable for purchase as well as harvested beef for the wellness consumers. Everyone was exposed to why this breed is so gentle, fertile, great mamas, exceptional milk producers, feed efficient, great weight gainers, tender, nutritious, and healthy to consume. This is why all of us are promoting Red Polls.

With a tight schedule, the Blue Ridge meeting started at 9 am with the minutes, treasurer's report, introduction of guests, and reports given. Our new Executive Secretary John Gerow and his wife Gennie from Louisville, Kentucky were introduced. He let us know that the office is up and running with plans to promote and serve Red Poll breeders to a new and productive plateau all under one roof. Next, Dr. Dan Schmiesing of Mardan Acres from St. Henry, Ohio discussed ARPA board news, as well as a report on a group of steers in a feed trial in Indiana. He also summarized the grass conference in Pennsylvania he attended with Jo Ellen Greene back in February. Mr. Phil Wyrick of Esquire Land and Cattle Co. addressed the group and began his promotion of the National Sale and General Meeting entitled "The Roundup in Little Rock". This event will be held at his ranch in Little Rock, Arkansas from October 22-24, 2010. With the hard work in planning this highly anticipated event, it will definitely be one to remember for many years to come. With such a successful turn out here at field day, it was also exceptional to have the Executive Secretary as well as three national board members present. This allowed for more individual attention in promoting, educating, and encouraging Red Poll cattle to everyone present.

After the meeting portion was closed, our program began. First, Mr. John Gerow discussed what the American Red Poll Association can do for the Blue Ridge Association and how the Blue Ridge members can in turn help the ARPA. A lot of helpful information was shared that will aid the members in getting their transactions efficiently. Warren Mincey, our NRCA agent for the county, discussed how the EQIP program that developed on our farm resulted in a water system (automated drinkers and fresh well water), rotational grazing with fencing, improved critical areas, and animal trails. The group walked a short distanced from the house and could see all the new projects completed and working. Dr. Dan Schmiesing then took the group down to the corral and discussed (by using cow/bull calves and cow/heifer pairs) what Red Polls can do for the commercial herd, as well as bull selection and replacement heifers. He explained how to produce weanlings at a 205 day actual weight to be one-half the size on their mothers. Successful examples were displayed

as bull calves ranging from 620 to 690 actual pounds and heifers ranging from 510 to 570 actual pounds, all on 1100 pound mothers.

Finally, Mr. Tom Chandler of Burlington, a client of mine and a commercial breeder, gave a very positive discussion explaining his breeding program. This past winter, he bred his entire herd to Red Poll genetics by artificial insemination and followed up with a good Red Poll bull for clean up. He is

betting on heterosis for more pounds on his steers and a lot more milk in his F1 replacement heifers. All of these discussions elevated the quality of the event.

A break was taken for lunch and Mr. Robert Baker, the manager at our local Tractor Supply Company in Burlington, was introduced. He brought out useful merchandise for all cattlemen to see as he chose numbers out of a hat and gave each person a gift from the store. Robert was very instrumental in furnishing products for our farm projects. This company is here to aid farmers in the community and should be used by us.

Following lunch, folks loaded up the trailers for a hayride to view the farm. After reaching the pastures, Mr. Joey Knight, our neighboring Caswell County Agriculture Agent, went through in detail how to make the rolling hills of the region produce grass with no-till drilling. He discussed rotating pastures and avoiding washing away the soil into our watersheds. By mixing pastures with different grass and legumes, the cattle are able to graze longer into the summer and at the same time have healthier soil. The group then saw a few spring calves and replacement heifers before we made our way to the main herd. This prompted an at-length discussion of the farm's breeding program and grass genetics as some cows were grazing while others were lying down with their bellies full.

This year's Blue Ridge Red Poll Association Field Day and meeting was definitely a success. It would not have been achieved without everyone's help, contributions, and the overwhelming interest in attending. Does Your Story Have Value?

We are a small breed with a small association, yet that small association is populated by a group with big passion about its cattle. I recall ARPA's various marketing "strategies" employed over the past 20 years, and in my view, much of our association's energy was spent trying to establish its spot in the "industry." This worked to the breed's favor, in part, as many Red Polls entered commercial herds. Consequently, some herds were lost completely as was the breed identity of those cattle. In that time our herd book has not grown much and our membership has changed maybe a little. Something else that has not grown much is the value of our cattle, one reason being we sell them only as cattle, often at market price. In summary, our breed population and the value of the cattle in that population has not changed much.

At the same time, there are other breeds growing rapidly in popularity. For some perspective, I will outline the Red Poll status according the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy (www.albc.org). Among their classification are Critical (fewest animals), Threatened, Watch, and Recovering (the most among the "rarer" breeds). Red Poll listed in Threatened category, while Ankole Watusi, Belted Galloway, Devon, Dexter and Highland are listed in the Recovering category. That information coupled with the science that we know and have consistently used to market our cattle (as obtained at USDA MARC; www. marc.usda.gov) makes the Red Poll algorithm unsolvable. I can only boil it down to: we lack a good story of historical recognition and let's face it, Red Poll is not a sexy name. Among the breeds listed as Recovering, those cattle farmers responsible for this growth often cite the breeds' importance as a "heritage breed" (which is loosely used since Highlands were imported to the U.S. only in the 1950's) and because of their meat quality (which is also highly variable and debatable). Those enjoying breed prosperity are selling a story, the notion that their cattle somehow represent what has been lost on the American farm.

Enter the USDA's loved and hated "Know Your Farmer, Know Your Food" (KYFKYF) program. As I understand it, this program is, if anything, a reality-check for everyone in the food continuum, providing a greater link for eaters with their food, and a greater sense of accountability and responsibility among food producers. As well, such direct farmer-to-consumer connections may mean greater profitability for the farmer. Presently, I think most Red Poll breeders are minions in an economy of scale, accepting of the status quo. Opponents of KYFKYF have dismissed it as not capable of "feeding the world" (which is true), yet if a producer can fill a niche in his or her area, then they are simply being entrepreneurial. Provided you have the market opportunity, fill that niche and let the other breeds feed the masses. That attitude is working for the other "rare breeds," providing them with a tool for breed sexification. They market the whole experience, from conception to consumption of beef (sound familiar?) – and include the people, the faces associated with that experience.

To become a successful direct marketer, you must, of course market your product. This takes time – as much time as it takes to do the farming – and a willingness to try new things. You must do market research; figure out what you can sell and for how much. You need a business plan. Often people ask me "how much can I charge for my beef?" I cannot answer that

because I do not know their customer's willingness to pay. I know of beef currently selling for as much as \$8 and as little as \$3 per pound (carcass basis). And nothing is special about that beef other than the brand – the farm name and it's personality – that people have applied to it. Market research is tricky, you say? Find me a farmer who has never tried to find out for how much their neighbor has ever or bought or sold something.

In addition to the marketing time investment, you must spend some time understanding the regulations associated with selling beef. This starts with the processor you choose and their inspection status. There are three categories of processing plants: USDA-inspected, State-inspected (there are 27 states with their own inspection system), or Custom-exempt. Here's the short version of what each means to you: (1) In order to sell individual pieces of beef, it must be slaughtered and wrapped under inspection; (2) state inspection means (usually - check in your state to be certain since each vary slightly) it can only be sold-in state, and USDA inspection means it can be sold anywhere in the U.S.; and (3) if selling quarters, sides or whole animals, they can be processed at any of those plant types. If using a Custom-exempt processor, you are no longer the animal's owner when it is slaughtered – it belongs to its new owner, your customer - you cannot sell or serve (for money) the beef to anyone. If you plan to retail products, make sure you have all of the right licenses, usually from your local health department and/ or the state department of agriculture. And if you think this is minor stuff, think again. Investigations into people selling (1) non-inspected meat or (2) selling meat without a license are ongoing.

There are legal considerations to what you claim about your cattle or your beef. Claims that are not acceptable include "Hormone-free," "Antibiotic-free," and "Chemical-free." Why? Reasons include the fact that cattle can never, ever be free of hormones, and that at its fundamental basis, meat is a complex of chemicals. Rather, claims like "raised without added growth hormones or antibiotics" are acceptable - provided, of course, they are absolutely true. You must have records indicative of your claims. As well, there are claims like "grass-fed," which means that an animal can have never, ever eaten any form of grain. There are looser terms such as "pasture-raised" or "grassfinished." There are "natural" meats, which is independent of how animals are raised, and because of that there are "naturallyraised" meats. Definitions of each claim are available from USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service (www.fsis.usda. gov).

Above all, honesty and integrity in your marketing is critical. I know of many producers wanting to make the grassfed claim yet also allow cattle to graze corn stalks and all that was missed by the combine or picker, as an example. Others try to make some safety claim. At this juncture, we know that all cattle, regardless of diet, are capable of harboring pathogens including E. coli O157:H7. We also have no evidence to support that beef raised one way is more or less healthy than beef raised another way. Instead, what can be different and therefore marketable points might include the story of the product or the flavor of the meat. Share the experience and celebrate the actual product, the meat we are raising, and charge for that experience. Otherwise, all we have is cheap protein, and that's not sexy.

McKees Honored for Lifetime Achievement

The American Red Poll Association honored Jim and Muriel McKee of McMarshall Farms, Washburn, IL at the 2009 Annual Membership Meeting Banquet in Sedalia, MO in October, 2009. The McKees were presented with ARPA's Lifetime Achievement Award for their contribution to building and promoting the Red Poll breed.

The "McKee Girls" (all six of Jim and Muriel's daughters and cousin Pam McKee Reed) told the McMarshall story from their unique prespective – focusing on feminity, uniformity and consistency of breeding.

Jim and Muriel started their Red Poll herd in 1947 after two years of visiting Red Poll herds around the country. They bought the best females that they could and selected El Paso Bill 62873 as their foundation sire. El Paso Bill was the

National Grand Champion bull in 1948 and the McKees consider his daughters the real foundation of the herd. More than 90% of



the females in the McMarshall herd today carry his blood. Bill also sired the 1955 National Grand Champion bull McMarshall 28.


In 1950, McKees bought Elm's Juno Ladd 68466 to cross on El Paso Bill's daughters. Ladd was National Grand Champion in 1950 and sired the 1953 and 1957 National Grand Champions. With the addition of Ladd, the McKees embarked on a line breeding program that has served them well over the years.

In 1960, McMarshall Farms began performance testing their herd. The 205 Day Weights have become part of their heifer replacement selection program.

For more than 60 years, Jim and Muriel have worked to breed and develop quality Red Poll cattle that will perform in any purebred or commercial herd. They have tirelessly worked to promote the breed and in support of the Association. The McMarshall Farms contribution will long be a part of our breed's heritage.






