









To Cull or Not to Cull

It's an age old argument amongst cattlemen. Within the industry there are many ideas and theories on culling the cow herd. Thus, the question, do we get rid of Lucy our favorite cow, because she's reached the ripe old age of eleven and didn't guite raise the best calf and didn't breed back, or does she stay in the herd, because she's Lucy? Well, in our herd culling is not just necessary it's a necessity and is something that must be done in order to keep our business running efficiently. You see culling has been a bitter strategy for years on the breeding side of the cattle industry, as well as other species of livestock. Beef producers have had to rid their herds of those females that have been dysfunctional in their job for numerous reasons. Economically this may be the best option for the producer, because this technique grants the producer some money for a new breeding piece, it also gives the breeder a female that can reproduce therefore adding on to the herd guicker, not to mention culling that animal that is not producing or doing their job, can save the cattleman feed costs as well.

First of all, culling gives the cattleman

money to purchase a fresh and hopefully reliable female. With a new prospect the producer has an efficient female that isn't dragging down the herd or breed efficiency and quality. If a true cattleman or woman is earning their living in the cow/calf industry then he or she cannot have futile females that cannot or will not earn their keep, because, ultimately, a producer's sustainability and reputation in the cattle business depends on the overall quality and performance of his or her herd.

Secondly, a new female is going to be able to reproduce progeny that will expand the herd's reputation and if all goes well we be one that will and can add to the cow herd year after year. This better helps the producer do his job because, without sound, profit making females a producer cannot stay in this ever demanding and changing field.

Thirdly, culling the inefficient female that isn't pulling her weight will free up feed resources, and money that are vital to not only the cow herd but also to the producer. These resources may not seem like much if we're just talking about Lucy but if we look at this across the board the impact of culling or not culling is huge to the entire cattle industry. This course of action frees up countless dollars for cattlemen to put productive animals back into their program as well as increases the quality of the cow/calf industry. Therefore, you have a win-win situation, the cattleman, the industry and the economy all profit from the method of culling the herd.

You see the cattlemen's livelihood depends on his herd. So, if we have a cow that is not sound, won't milk or for some other reason cannot or will not raise a calf efficiently, it is not an option for the cattleman to cull, it's an absolute necessity in order for him to produce cattle that are going to be economical as well as functional that will be able to produce a product that the consumer or the breeder will find desirable. So , if Lucy, as much as we love her isn't doing her job as a momma cow in the herd, whether it's her age, she's not milking or for some other reason, we're going to have to do what's best for our operation and cull her. Is this always easy??? No, but in the cattle industry it's a necessity.

....remembering the "Good Old Days"

It's been my pleasure to be around Red Polls for over seventy years. Many changes have been witnessed...many others forgotten. This issue, we're going to re-visit 1983....right in the middle of the last glory years of our breed, 1975 thru 1995.

In 1960, when I was 12, my Dad sold his first National Sale for the Red Poll Association as an auctioneer, then called the Red Poll Cattle Club of America. Thus would begin a period of twenty-five years where Dad sold all Red Poll sales sanctioned by the Association. In addition to this, he also served on the breed's Board of Director's for 18 of the last 21 years... almost always as Vice President. This gave our family a unique picture of what was going on in the breed. From about 1965 until 1985, I served as a ring man at every sale Dad sold.

In 1983, as Dad was nearing retirement, the Association was invited to hold our National meeting and sale during the State Fair in the great state of Arkansas. During this time, annual meetings usually seated near 100 people and the banquet was a BIG deal. It was a dress-up affair, where women selected beautiful long dresses well in advance of the meeting and men generally wore sport coats and ties to the banquet. The sale in 1983 featured 85-90 head of Red Polls, and over 150 people attended the sale that day.

Here's where it got interesting. There was no sale ring on the fairgrounds, so we were assigned a big area for the cattle...an auction block was found, the large Arkansas Association set up 150 chairs with a wide aisle down the middle, it was warm...so warm that all of the windows and the overhead doors were open, and the place was full of excitement. The sale began around 1pm. Dad was on the block...I was standing front center taking bids, and Martha was in the back taking care of the sale cattle.

The sale started out on fire. Cattle were selling high....bidding was coming from all over, and we were on our way to a record setting event. But then.... THEN CAME THE RODEO BULLS.... not the kind you rope...oh no...the kind you ride!!!!

My Dad was known as a joker... always kidding and teasing people. So when he started yelling "The Bulls... The Bulls!!!" people laughed. It was no laughing matter. While our sale was going on, the rodeo was taking place next door. The wrong gate was opened...the bulls escaped the Arena...the cowboys got around them and turned them back...and drove them right thru those open doors I by Mike Parks mentioned...right in to our sale ring!


Here are some thoughts from others.....

Gail Spegal. I was attending the sale with Gerald Crafton. When those bulls came in, it was everyone for themselves. Gerald and I grabbed Dorothy Parks by the elbows...carried her to the back of the auction block... set her up with Emery....and then climbed up there ourselves.

Dawn Jackson Nunan. I was the Red Poll Queen in 1983. I believe I was the first queen. It was important that I be there, so I got out of school and Mom and I drove to Little Rock. When the bulls came in, Mother and I climbed up in an open window and stood there until the bulls left the building. It seemed easy at the time. I'm not sure how easy it would be today to get up in a window four feet off the floor!

John Rager. Linda and I drove down to the sale without cattle. I had seen and heard Emery Parks sell many times.... but it's the first time I ever heard him speechless! When the bulls came in, Linda and I went in amongst the sale cattle (All were tied up), stood by their heads holding their halters, and watched the bulls go by.

Joe Jackson. Our cattle were fied near the entrance where the bulls came in. We couldn't believe it when the rodeo guys shut the overhead doors to keep the bulls IN the barn with us. I look at them...said something about this can't end well....and we went out a small exit door by our stalls. Bulls were looking everywhere for a way out...they were jumping thru windows. It was a VERY FRIGHTENING 15 MINUTES. As some of them escaped, they ran in to the rabbit barn...hooking their horns on the rabbit cages. We later heard the bulls...at least some of them.... escaped the fairgrounds and were finally caught in a real rough section of Little Rock.



Phil Wyrick. 1) My Mother was there, watching her grandkids play in the dirt in front of that big door. She saw the bulls...grabbed my 5 year old nephew...and ran. She felt the bulls as they passed by her. That nephew is now an Air Force pilot.

2) One of our Arkansas breeders grabbed a folding chair and was hitting the bulls, forcing them to jump out of windows and away from the people. The cowboys eventually roped all of the bulls to catch them. 3) Bob Tallman was the rodeo announcer. He is now in the Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame. He came in and tried to calm down our crowd... assuring all of us how sorry they were.

Mike Parks. I've never felt so helpless. I was facing the bulls...everyone else had their backs to them. I yelled, but it made no difference...the bulls charged thru the seating area and people and chairs were going everywhere. When it was over, only Joy Russell of Battle Creek, Michigan was injured. She had a broken arm. Robby Tomlinson was working for Purdue at the time. He saw the bulls coming, and noticed that Bonnie Hall of Nashville, Tenn. Was sitting on a showbox nursing a baby (probably Daniel). He grabbed her.... took her to a back corner....then stood in front of her until it was over. The baby never knew anything was going on.

Needless to say, this was the most unusual National Sale I have ever attended. What started out as a potential record breaker ended up a disaster. I still remember the look on the consignor's faces as the next 6 or 8 heifers that came in the ring had to be dropped out....no one bid on them. Dad struggled to re-gain control of the sale. (He told me later that in his 50 years in the auction business, that was his biggest disappointment....not being able to re-gain control of the auction.

The sale ended....finally. The crowd

dispersed and headed home. But NO ONE, and I mean NO ONE, ever forgot the sale when the Rodeo bulls came to visit!

(These comments above were based on memories and on stories told to me. I believe that they are factual.)



Red Poll Breeders to Participate in Bull Test



ARPA members in the west and south will be participating in the Connors College Bull Test .The Bull Testing and Sale Facility is located on the campus of Connors State College in Warner, OK.

The Connors State College (CSC) Bull Test was initiated by Agriculture Instructor Robert Hodges in 1961. The bull sale was a victim of the severe crash in the cattle market in the early 1970s and was discontinued in 1974. In 1977, Gary Harding was hired to lead the Agriculture Department and restart the bull testing program. The 1977 test and sale consisted of only 26 bulls. The second test under Harding's guidance included 45 bulls but there was an ice storm the day of the sale and the auctioneer, Col. Holland Jester wrecked his car on the way to the sale. CSC began conducting two tests and sales annually beginning in 1979. Col. Bruce Brooks of Marietta, OK has sold every sale since.

The Connors State College Bull Test Station meets the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) definition as a central bull test station as a facility where bulls from different herds are assembled to evaluate performance under uniform conditions. Specifically, the CSC Bull Test Station functions to: • Evaluate bulls for post weaning

 Evaluate bulls for post weaning performance

• Educate seedstock producers and commercial cattlemen about the value and utilization of performance records and

• expected progeny differences (EPDs)

• Provide a source of and market for performance tested bulls

• Provide an opportunity for new breeders to introduce their breeding programs to potential customers

Both Fall and Spring test are 112 days in length. The bulls will be fed a complete growing-finishing ration free choice designed to allow for maximum growth, but not intended to overfinish fast gaining bulls. Course grass hay will also be available to the bulls throughout the test. The bulls will be weighed every 28 days.

A tour of the Bull Test Facility will take place on Saturday, October 6 Meet at the Connors State College Sale Facility by 8:30 am to go on the tour.




